THIRTEENTH MEETING, 4 P. M.—Prayer by Eld. J. Fargo.

The following resolutions were introduced, considered, and adopted at this meeting :--

Resolved, That Eld. E. W. Farnsworth be recommended to labor a part of the year, as the way may open, in the Missouri Conference.

Resolved, That we consider the tract and missionary work, in its different phases, one of great importance, and we recommend that special efforts be put forth for the increased circulation of all our periodicals.

Resolved, That it is the judgment of this General Conference that the blessing of God attends the canvassing work; and we think that an experience in this work is an excellent preparation to efficiency in other departments of the cause

Resolved, That we request the President of the General Conference to arrange with the Publishing Committee of the S. D. A. Publishing Association to publish a book to be entitled, "The Seventh-day Adventist Year-Book," which shall contain such portions of the proceedings of the General Conference, and such other matters, as the Committee may think best to insert therein.



Resolved, That we recommend the publication of such a work each year, and that, in addition to such matter as appeared in the first number, it also contain a full list of the names of all our ministers, with their post-office addresses, and a brief history of the rise and progress of our work, especially noticing the operations and progress of the current year.

The first resolution was also adopted by a rising vote of the congregation. With reference to the third resolution it was—

Voted, That the matter of preparing the Year Book for 1884 be assigned to a committee of three, to be appointed by the Chair. The Chair named W. H. Littlejohn, H. A. St. John, and M. C. Wilcox as this committee.

Adjourned to call of Chair.

THE CHICAGO OFFICE. ---Elder Moon stated to the Committee that at present he was serving as a transportation agent of the denomination, with office at Chicago, and Bro. F.A.

Buzzell wasacting in his name, while he himself was laboring in other fields, and that he would not feel free to thus permit the business to be continued another year. It was suggested by brethren Heary and Tait that it was desirable to secure different quarters at Chicago if the International Religious

Liberty Association and transportation business were to be continued. It being difficult to decide upon anything definite relating to these questions, it was---

<u>Voted</u>, To constitute Elders Moan and Tait and Bro. Henry a committee to give the matter special consideration, and to report at a future meeting.

[The following anonymous poem was found, about eight years ago, in a magazine published in Philadelphia. Its beauty of language, fervor of feeling, and exalted religious sentiment, claim for it a wider circulation than it has yet attained.]

I'm growing very old. This weary head. That hath so often leaned on Jesus' breast In days long past that seem almost a dream. Is bent and hoary with its weight of years. These limbs that followed him - my Master - oft From Galilee to Judsh; yea, that stood Beneath the cross, and trembled with his groans, Refuse to bear me even through the streets To preach unto my children. E'en my lips Refuse to form the words my heart sends forth. My ears are dull, they scarcely hear the sobs Of my dear children gathered round my couch; God lays his hand upon me, -- yea, his hand And not his rod, - the gentle hand that I Felt, those three years, so often pressed in mine In friendship such as passeth woman's love.

I'm old,—so old I cannot recollect
The faces of my friends, and I forget
The words and deeds that make up daily life;
But that dear face and every word He spoke
Grow more distinct as others fade away.
So that I live with him and holy dead
More than with the living.

Some seventy years ago
I was a fisher by the sacred sea.

It was at sunset. How the tranquil tide
Bathed dreamily the pebbles! How the light
Crept up the distant hills, and in its wake
Soft, purple shadows wrapped the dewy fields, I,
And then He came and called me. Then I gazed,
For the first time, on that sweet face. Those eyes,
From out of which, as from a window, shone
Divinity, looked on my inmost soul

And lighted it forever. Then his words Broke on the silence of my heart, and made The whole world musical. Incarnate Love Took hold of me, and claimed me for its own. I followed in the twilight, holding fast His mantle.

O, what holy walks we had,
Through harvest fields and desolate, dreary wastes!
And oftentimes he leaned upon my arm,
Wearlaed nd wayworn. I was young and strong.
And so upbore him. Lord, now I am weak,
And old, and feeble! Let me rest on thee!

### [Minutes of the General Conference Committee, Spring Session, March 6, 1895, p 5]

After brief discussion, it was ---

Voted, To adopt the following arrangement: ---

- 1. To issue the BULLETIN quarterly during the General Conference biennial period, in a single volume, at fifty cents for the entire time, including the Extras during the General Conference session.
- 2. To issue the next number in April; it being understad understood that it should contain a workers' directory, a grouping of all the reshbutions and actions of the Conference recently held, together with an index of the proceedings of the same, etc.
- 3. To cut off all copies in clubs to delegates and schools, except in cases where twenty-five cents additional is paid on single subscriptions.
- ,4. To close the orders for bound copies with the April number, and send to all subscribers for same.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Elder Durland asked counsel in regard to refunding tuition to students of Bible school under circumstances of necessary absence or temporary discontinuance of the school, etc.

Moved by Prof. Prescott, and seconded by Elder Porter,
That tuition to students attending the Bible school be refunded for time of Galeral Conference, and for necessary
absence for any period of two weeks.

ANTICIPATING that the Bulletin would be discontinued between sessions of the General Conference, no call was made for two-year subscriptions at the last conference. 



schools organized as soon as practicable. But they wish to move cautiously, and to conform as far as possible to the recommendations of this Conference in regard to this matter.

FOURTEENTH MEETING, DEC. 19, 3:30 P. M.—Prayer by Eld. J. H. Waggoner.

The Committee on Church Quarterly Meetings reported as follows:-

Your Committee recommend that the church quarterly meetings be held the first-shabath and litest-day in December, March, June, and September, and that one of the members of the Executive Committee of each State Conference hold a general meeting in each district within the bounds of their respective Conferences as often as once in three months if possible, this new arrangement to take effect March 1, 1883.

This was amended by inserting the expression, "or some minister whom they may appoint," after the words "State Conference," and finally laid upon the table.

The committee appointed to consider the wants of the Scandinavian mission, presented the following report, which was unanimously adopted:—

Whereas, Considerable sums of money have been sent by our Scandinavian brethren to men who were strangers, and in some cases to unworthy persons; and—

Whereas, The General Conference Committee exercises a watchful care for the wants and necessities of all the missions, receiving authentic information from our experienced missionaries, and is thus prepared to judge of the importance of private appeals; therefore—

Resolved, That it is the safe and wiser plan for all persons wishing to aid the European missions to forward their donations to the authorized treasurers of the mission funds.

Whereas, The building in Christiana, Norway, used at present for printing and holding meetings, is larger than is necessary, and will require a large amount of means to provide for interest and future payments; and—

Whereas, Another building can be erected, better suited for their work, at less cost: therefore-

Resolved, That we approve of their effort to sell, and make other arrangements.

The following resolutions were then presented by the Committee on Resolutions, and adopted:—

Resolved, That we express our unabated confidence in the Testimonies which have been so graciously given to this people, which have guided our ways and corrected our errors, from the rise of the third angel's message to the present time; and that we especially express our gratitude for Testimony No. 31, which we accept as a token of the care of God over us,—an evidence that he has not forsaken us, notwithstanding our many backsildings.

Resolved, That we hereby tender to the brethren of the New York and Pennsylvania Cooferences, and especially to the church at Rome, N. Y., our sincere thanks for the cordial reception extended by them to this Conference, and for their generous hospitality while we have been with them. A vote of thanks was also extended to the railroads that granted the delegates favors in coming to the Conference.

Eld. R. F. Andrews invited the General Conference to hold its next annual session in Illinois, and Elds. H. A. St. John of Ohio and C. A. Washburn of Iowa extended the same invitation, offering the Conferences the hospitalities of their respective States.

On motion, the Conference adjourned.




Through 1954 the YB was approximately 5x7½ inches with slight variations. The overall size of the Yearbook changed in 1955 to the 6x9 inches still used today




### The 2011 Yearbook weighed 3 lbs, 4.4 oz

#### PROCEEDINGS OF GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE.

There have been two sessions of the General Conference Committee since the last session of the Conference in the autumn of 1889. The first session was held Dec. 26, 1889, to Jan. 9, 1890; the second, July 8-30, 1890. It was recommended that D. T. Fero attend the Ministers' Bible School; and after that is over, make Idaho his field of labor.

It was recommended that T. E. Bowen and wife, of Pennsylvania, go to West Virginia; she to act as Secretary of the Tract Society, and he to engage in the canvassing work; and that J. B. Buck and wife, of Michigan, go to Arkansas to labor; she to take the position of Secretary of the Tract Society, and he to engage in canvassing.

R. S. Webber, of Maine, was recommended to remain in Battle Creek, after the close of the Ministers' School, and labor in the interests of the Battle Creek

J. O. Corliss was instructed to labor in Washington, D. C., under the direction of the National Religious Liberty Association, as long as that Association may think it best for him to remain there.

The Loma Linda Sanitarium, located near Redlands, Cal., was

dedicated on the 15th of April.

April 18 occurred an earthquake in the central portion of California, which resulted in the destruction of about ten square miles of property in San Francisco, taking, in the general loss of about three hundred and fifty million dollars, the following enterprises which were conducted by our people: The Vegetarian Café, the "Home" for Workers, the Branch Sanitarium, and food store, Dr. Lamb's private sanitarium, and the homes of many of the brethren and sisters.






## Map of United States districts – 1890YB




## Western European Union Conferences 1910 Yearbook

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4. Whereas, The closing of the Battle Creek College has deprived several hundred students of the privilege of prosecuting their studies, and has also been a source of discouragement to many of our brethren; therefore-

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this body that the Trustees of the College should re-open the same as soon as the condition of things in Battle Creek church will justify such action, and the Trustees shall be able to procure the services of suitable persons to constitute the Faculty of the College.

5. Resolved, That before Battle Creek College shall be re-opened, we recommend that the Trustees make provision for a suitable boarding-house for the students; also for the performance of manual labor on the part of the students; and, as far as possible, for the conducting of the College upon a plan which shall harmonize in all respects with the light which God has given us upon this point through the Testimonies.

At the Rome meeting, the subject of changing the Constitution, so as to provide for a Board of Trustees consisting of nine members, instead of seven, three new members to be elected every year in place of the three whose term of office expires, was introduced and considered, but finally referred to a committee of three who were to report at the legal meeting in Battle Creek. After considering the matter, this committee reported, recommending that no action be taken in this respect for the present.

On motion the meeting adjourned.

#### CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE. AS AMENDED TO JAN. 1, 1883.

For the purpose of securing unity and efficiency in labor, and promoting the general interests of the cause of present truth, and of perfecting the organization of the Seventh-day Adventists, we, the delegates from the several State Conferences, hereby proceed to organize a General Conference, and adopt the following Constitution for the government thereof :-

ARTICLE I .- This Conference shall be called The General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, and shall be composed of delegates from the different State Conferences, and such ministers as shall have been employed as missionaries during any part of the year.

- ART. II.—Section 1. The officers of this Conference shall be a President, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of three, of whom the President shall be one.
- SEC. 2. The Executive Committee shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur in their number by death, resignation, or otherwise.
- ART. III.-The duties of the President and Secretary shall be such respectively as usually pertain to those offices.
- ART. IV .- It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse means under the direction of the Executive Committee, and keep an account of

the same, and make a full report thereof to the regular meetings of the Con-

- ART. V .- SEC. 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to take the general supervision of all ministerial labor, and see that the same is properly distributed; and they shall take the special supervision of all missionary labor, and as a missionary board shall have the power to decide where such labor is needed, and who shall go as missionaries to perform the same; and they shall audit and settle accounts with ministers and others in the employ of the Con-
- SEC. 2. Means for missionary operations may be received by donation from State Conferences, churches, or individuals; and the Committee are authorized to call for means when needed.
- SEC. 3. When any State Conference desires ministerial labor from a minister not a resident within the bounds of such Conference, their request shall be made to the General Conference Executive Committee, and ministers sent by said Committee shall be considered under the jurisdiction of the Conference Committee of such State: Provided, 1. That if such minister consider the State Committee inefficient, or their action so far wrong as to render his labor ineffectual, he may appeal to the General Conference Executive Committee: Provided, 2. That if such State Committee consider such minister inefficient, they may appeal to the General Conference Committee, who shall decide on the matter of complaint, and take such action as they may think proper.
- SEC. 4. The General Conference Executive Committee shall have power during the intervals between the yearly meetings to license ministers who may be raised up in mission fields.
- SEC. 5. It shall be the cuty of the ministers and others in the employ of the General Conference to make a written report to each annual meeting thereof of each day's occupation during the Conference year, or such portion of the year as they may have been in the employ of the Conference.
- SEC. 6. It shall be the duty of the Conference to select a committee of four delegates who have not been in the employ of the Conference the preceding year, to act with the Executive Committee in the examination and settlement of ac-
- ART. VI.-Each State Conference shall be entitled to one delegate in the General Conference, and one additional delegate for every twenty delegates in the State Conference, such delegates to the General Conference to be chosen by the State Conferences or their Committees: Provided, That the delegates to such State Conferences be elected according to the following ratio, to wit: Each church to the number of twenty members or under, shall be entitled to one delegate, and one delegate for every additional fifteen members.
- ART, VII .-- The officers shall be elected at the regular meetings of the Conference, and shall hold their offices for the term of one year, or until their successors are chosen.
- ART. VIII .- Sec. 1. The regular meetings of the Conference shall be held annually, and the time and place of holding the same shall be determined by the Executive Committee, by whom due notice thereof shall be given through the Review.
  - SEC. 2. Special meetings may be called at the option of the Committee.
- ART. IX. This Constitution may be aftered or amended by a three-fourths vote of the members present at any meeting.

#### CONSTITUTION

#### of the

#### General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists

(As revised at the 60th Session held in San Antonio, Texas, United States of America, July 2 to July 11, 2015)

#### ARTICLE I-NAME

This organization shall be known as the General Conference of Seventh@day Adventists.

#### ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purpose of the General Conference is to teach all nations the everlasting gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the commandments of God.

#### ARTICLE III—DIVISIONS OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

The General Conference conducts much of its work through its divisions, which in turn are comprised of unions in specific areas of the world. Each division of the General Conference is authorized to carry out responsibilities in the territory assigned to it. It shall act in full harmony with the General Conference Constitution and Bylaws, the General Conference Working Policy, and actions of the Executive Committee.

In order to carry the authority of the General Conference, the actions of division committees shall, of necessity, be in harmony with and complementary to the decisions of the General Conference in Session, and the actions of the General Conference Executive Committee between Sessions

#### ARTICLE IV—MEMBERSHIP

- Sec. 1. The membership of the General Conference shall
- a. All unions that have been or shall be properly organized and accepted by vote of the General Conference in Session. b. All of the following entities that are directly attached to the General Conference or to a division:
  - 1) Local conferences 2) Local mission and functional equivalents thereof pro-
- vided they have two or more officers and an executive com-mittee, observe a schedule of regular constituency meetings and have been properly organized.

#### ARTICLE V—GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSIONS

- Sec. 1. The General Conference shall hold guinguennial Sessions at such time and place as the General Conference Executive Committee shall designate and announce by a notice published in the Adventist Review or Adventist World or other publications voted by the General Conference Executive Committee in three consecutive months beginning at least four months before the date for the opening of the Session. In case special world conditions make it imperative to postpone the calling of the Session, the General Conference Executive Committee, in regular or special council, shall have authority to make such postponement, not to exceed two
- years, giving notice to all constituent organizations.

  Sec. 2. The General Conference Executive Committee may call special sessions of the General Conference at such time and place as it considers proper, by means of a notice as provided for in Sec. 1., and the transactions of such special sessions shall have the same force as those of the regular sessions.
- Sec. 3. At least one-third of the total delegates authorized hereinafter under Sec. 5. of Article V, must be present at the opening meeting of any regular or specially called General Conference Session to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Once the Session is declared open, the delegates remaining present shall constitute a quorum.
- Sec. 4. The election of officers and the voting on all matters of business shall be by vivativoce vote, or as designated by the Chair, unless otherwise requested by a majority of the
- Sec. 5. The delegates to a General Conference Session shall

be designated as follows:

b. Delegates at large.

- c. In case of financial exigency or other major crisis within the Church or in the international arena, the General Conference Executive Committee may take an action to reduce the maximum number of delegates to a particular General Conference Session. Such reduction shall then be applied to both regular delegates and delegates at large.
- Sec. 6. Regular delegates shall represent the General Conference's member units as defined in Article IV,
- a. Delegates representing union conferences and union of churches conferences having division affiliation shall be appointed by the respective union executive committee.
- b. Delegates representing union missions and union of churches missions having division affiliation shall be appointed by the respective division executive committees in consultation with the organizations concerned.
- c. Delegates representing conferences and missions having union conference affiliation shall be appointed by the respective union conference executive committees in consultation with the organizations concerned.
- d. Delegates representing conferences and missions having union mission affiliation shall be appointed by the respective division executive committees in consultation with the organi-
- e. Delegates representing conferences and missions directly attached to divisions shall be appointed by the respective division executive committees in consultation with the organizations concerned.
- f. Delegates representing division institutions, the number of whom shall correspond to the number of division institutions within each division, shall be appointed by the respective division executive committees in consultation with the organizations concerned
- g. Delegates representing union conferences and union of churches conferences directly attached to the General Conference shall be appointed by the executive committee of the respective attached entity.
- Delegates representing union missions, union of churches missions, and local conferences and missions directly attached to the General Conference shall be appointed by the General Conference Executive Committee in consultation with the organizations concerned
- Sec. 7. Regular delegates shall be allotted on the following
- a. Each union conference shall be entitled to two delegates other than its president (who is a delegate at large) without regard to membership size.
- b. Each union mission shall be entitled to one delegate other than its president (who is a delegate at large) without regard to membership size.
- c. Each union of churches conference shall be entitled to one delegate other than its president (who is a delegate at large) without regard to membership size,
- d. Each union of churches mission is represented by its
- president (who is a delegate at large).

  e. Each local conference shall be entitled to two delegates without regard to membership size.
- f. Each local mission/field shall be entitled to one delegate thout regard to membership size.
- g. Each division shall be entitled to additional delegates based upon its membership as a proportion of the world Church membership. The total number of delegates from all divisions under this provision shall not exceed 400. The resulting quota of division delegates under this provision shall be distributed first to the unions that are affiliated with that division, based on each union's proportion of the division membership. Any unallocated delegate entitlements under this process shall be allocated at the discretion of the division executive committee.

#### BYLAWS

#### of the

#### General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists

Sec. 1. The General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, hereinafter referred to as the General Conference, normally shall conduct its worldwide work through its divisions, each division to operate within a specified territory in harmony with General Conference policies.

Sec. 2. The duly organized divisions are: East-Central Africa Division, Euro-Asia Division, Inter-American Division, Inter-European Division, North American Division, Northern Asia-Pacific Division, South American Division, South Pacific Division, Southern Africa-Indian Ocean Division, Southern Asia Division, Southern Asia-Pacific Division, Trans-European Division, and West-Central Africa Division. The boundaries of these divisions shall be subject to adjustment at Annual Councils of the General Conference Executive Commit

Sec. 3. If a territorial adjustment is made at an Annual Council, it shall be made only provided each division and other territory affected is represented at the council by at least one of its officers, or in the case of an unorganized territory, by a senior church leader from that territory. An exception to the requirement of such representation shall be made in a condition of emergency. In such a case, the General Conference Executive Committee shall make whatever adjustments are necessary for the conduct of the work in the territories affected.

Sec. 4. Administrations of all organizations and institutions within a division's territory shall be responsible to their respective executive committees/boards and operate in harmony with division and General Conference Executive Committee actions and policies. General Conference institu-tions and fields without divisional affiliation shall operate in harmony with the General Conference Executive Committee

#### ARTICLE II—SESSION COMMITTEES

Sec. 1. At each regular Session of the General Conference, such committees as may be found necessary, including the following, shall be elected for the duration of the Session to consider items of business that may be referred to them and to bring their reports and recommendations to the Session:

- a. Session Church Manual Committee
- b. Session Constitution and Bylaws Committee
- c. Session Nominating Committee
- d. Session Steering Committee Sec. 2. Church Manual Committee: The chair of the Church Manual Committee shall be an officer of the General
- Sec. 3. Constitution and Bylaws Committee: The chair of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee shall be an officer of
- Sec. 4. Nominating Committee: a. The membership of the Nominating Committee shall consist of the following:
- 1) Each division and each attached union shall be entitled to select for membership on the Nominating Committee ten percent of its delegation to the session, after excluding any delegates at large employed by the General Conference or it institutions and any delegates selected by the General Conference Administrative Committee and assigned by the Administrative Committee to meet with the General Conference and institution delegation.
- 2) Delegates at large who are excluded under 1) above shall be entitled to representation on the Nominating Committee equal to eight percent of their total number
- b. The members of the Nominating Committee shall be
- chosen as follows:
  1) Each division delegation and each delegation from a union attached to the General Conference shall act as a unit in selecting members to which it is entitled. Excluded from this process shall be any delegates at large currently employed by the General Conference or its institutions and any delegates selected by the General Conference Administrative Committee and assigned by the Administrative Committee to meet with the General Conference and institution delegation.

- 2) The delegates at large currently employed by the General Conference or its institutions, along with any delegates selected by the General Conference Administrative Committee and assigned by the Administrative Committee to meet with the General Conference and institution delegation, shall act as a unit in selecting members to which they are entitled.
- The election of the above representatives on the Nominating Committee shall be by the method of voting considered by each delegation to be most convenient and efficient, taking into consideration the size of the delegation and
- c. Each group (named in Sec. 4. b. 1) and 2) above) shall select its representatives on the Nominating Committee to represent, as far as possible, the various geographical areas, organizational segments, and types of activity of the territory.
- d. Those chosen as members of the Nominating Committee must be duly accredited delegates in attendance at the General Conference Session.
- e. Delegates holding elected positions under the provisions of Article VI, Sec. 1. of the Constitution shall not be members of the Nominating Committee.
- f. No delegate shall nominate more than one person for election to the Nominating Committee.
- g. The Nominating Committee shall elect its own chair and secretary under the temporary chair of the president of the General Conference whose term is expiring
- h. The Nominating Committee shall limit its nominations to those positions for which budgetary provision has been made.
- i. In order to expedite the work of the Nominating Committee, the representatives from each division shall be allowed a reasonable amount of time to meet and consider the personnel needs of their respective divisions and to make recommendations to the full Nominating Committee. Decisions of these groups shall not be binding on the Nominating Committee as a whole, but shall be submitted as recommendations which will be considered.
- Sec. 5. Steering Committee: The Steering Committee shall be chaired by the General Conference President or his designee. Membership of the Steering Committee shall be recommended to the Session by the General Conference Executive Committee. The Steering Committee shall meet as
- a. Manage and monitor progress of the Session and its
- b. Determine and amend, if necessary, the sequencing of the Session's business agenda,
- c. Serve as the referral point for any new business item not related to the approved Session agenda or any business item that the Session wishes to refer for further study, other than items that rightfully pertain to standing Session committees,
- d. Report to the Session, as needed, regarding the processing of proposals that have been referred for its consideration.

#### ARTICLE III—GENERAL CONFERENCE VICE PRESIDENTS AND DIVISION VICE PRESIDENTS

- Sec. 1. General vice presidents of the General Conference shall be elected to assist the president with the general administrative work of the General Conference, In addition a vice president shall be elected to serve as president of each division of the General Conference.
- Sec. 2. A general vice president of the General Conference shall, in the absence of or at the discretion of the president, chair meetings of the General Conference Executive Committee.
- Sec. 3. The role of the general vice presidents of the General Conference, in relationship to the divisions, is as fol-
- a. To serve as liaisons between the General Conference president and the divisions.
- b. To serve as administrative resource counselors.
- c. To strengthen the bond of the world Church.

## Fundamental Beliefs (22) – 1931 Yearbook

#### FUNDAMENTAL BELIEFS OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS

Seventh-day Adventists hold certain fundamental beliefs, the principal features of which, together with a portion of the scriptural references upon which they are based, may be summarized as follows:

- That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God, contain an all-sufficient revelation of His will to men, and are the only unerring rule of faith and practice.
   Tim. 3:15-17.
- 2. That the Godhead, or Trinity, consists of the Eternal Father, a personal, spiritual Being, omnipotent, omnipresent, omniscient, infinite in wisdom and love; the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of the Eternal Father, through whom all things were created and through whom the salvation of the redeemed hosts will be accomplished; the Holy Spirit, the third person of the Godhead, the great regenerating power in the work of redemption. Matt. 28:19.
- 3. That Jesus Christ is very God, being of the same nature and essence as the Eternal Father. While retaining His divine nature He took upon Himself the nature of the human family, lived on the earth as a man, exemplified in His life as our Example the principles of righteousness, attested His relationship to God by many mighty miracles, died for our sins on the cross, was raised from the dead, and ascended to the Father, where He ever lives to make intercession for us. John 1:1, 14; Heb. 2:9-18; 8:1, 2; 4:14-16; 7:25.
- 4. That every person in order to obtain salvation must experience the new birth; that this comprises an entire transformation of life and character by the recreative power of God through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. John 3:16; Matt. 18:3; Acts 2:37-39.
- 5. That baptism is an ordinance of the Christian church and should follow repentance and forgiveness of sins. By its observance faith is shown in the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ. That the proper form of baptism is by immersion. Rom. 6:1-6; Acts 16:30-33.
- 6. That the will of God as it relates to moral conduct is comprehended in His law of ten commandments; that these are great moral, unchangeable precepts, binding upon all men, in every age. Ex. 20:1-17.
- 7. That the fourth commandment of this unchangeable law requires the observance of the seventh day Sabbath. This holy institution is at the same time a memorial of creation and a sign of sanctification, a sign of the believer's rest from his own works of sin, and his entrance into the rest of soul which Jesus promises to those who come to Him. Gen. 2:1-3; Ex. 20:8-11; 31:12-17; Heb. 4:1-10.

## FUNDAMENTAL BELIEFS OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS

(As amended at the 60th Session held in San Antonio, Texas, United States of America, July 2 to July 11, 2015)

Seventh-day Adventists accept the Bible as their only reed and hold certain fundamental beliefs to be the teaching of the Holy Scriptures. These beliefs, as set forth here, constitute the church's understanding and expression of the teaching of Scripture. Revision of these statements may be expected at a General Conference Session when the church is led by the Holy Spritt to a fuller understanding of Bible truth or finds better language in which to express the teachings of God's Holy Word.

#### 1. The Holy Scriptures

The Holy Scriptures, Old and New Testaments, are the written Word of God, given by divine inspiration. The inspired authors spoke and wrote as they were moved by the Holy Spirit, In his Word, Cod has committed to humanity the knowledge necessary for salvation. The Holy Scriptures are the supreme, authoritative, and the infallible revelation of His will. They are the standard of character, the test of experience, the definitive revealer of doctrines, and the trustworthy record of God's acts in history. #### 2. The Trinity

There is one God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, a unity of three coetemal Persons. God is immortal, all-powerful, all-knowing, above all, and ever present. He is infinite and beyond human comprehension, yet known through His self-evelation. God, who is lone, is forever worthy of worship, adoration, and service by the whole creation. (Gen. 1:26; Deut. 60‡, ba. 60‡, Matt. 28:19; John 3:16; 2 Cor. 1:21, 22; 13:14; Eph. 4:46; 1 Peter 1:23.

#### I. The Father

God the eternal Father is the Creator, Source, Sustainer, and Sovereign of all creation. He is just and holy, merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and fathfulness. The qualities and powers exhibited in the Son and the Holy Spirit are also those of the Father. (Gen. 1:1; Deut. 4:35; Ps. 110:1-4; John 3:16; 14:9; 1 Cor. 15:26; 1 Tim. 1:17; John 4:8; Rev. 4:11.)

#### 4. The Sor

God the eternal Son became incarnate in Jesus Christ. Through Him all things were created, the character of God is revealed, the salvation of humanity is accomplished, and the world is judged. Forever truly God, He became also truly human, Jesus the Christ. He was conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the virigin Mary. He lived and experienced tempation as a human being, but perfectly exemplified the right-eousness and love of God. By His miracles He manifested God's power and was attented as God's promised Mensiah. He suffered and died voluntarily on the cross for our sins and in our place, was raised from the dead, and ascended to heaven to minister in the heavenly sanctuary in our behalf. He will Come again in glory for the final deliverance of His people and the restoration of all things. (Na. 513-46; Dan. 9:25-27; Luke 1:35; John 1:1-3, 14; 5:22; 10-30; 14:1-3, 9, 11; Rom. 6:23; 1 Cor. 1:5:3, 4; 2 Cor. 3:18; 5:17-19; Phil. 2:5; Heb. 2:9-18; 8:1, 2.)

#### 5. The Holy Spirit

God the eternal Spirit was active with the Father and the Son in Creation, incarnation, and redemption. He is as much a person as are the Father and the Son. He inspired the writers of Scripture. He filled Christ's life with power. He draws and convicts human beings; and those who respond He renews and transforms into the image of God. Sent by the Father and the Son to be always with His children, He extends spiritual gifts to the church, empowers it to bear witness to Christ, and in harmony with the Scriptures leads it into all truth. (Gen. 1:1, 2; 2 Sam. 23:2; Ps. 51:11; Isa. 61:1; Luke 1:35; 4:18; John 14:16-18, 26; 15:26; 16:7-13; Acts 1:8; 5:3; 10:38; Rom. 5:5; 1 Cor. 12:7-11; 2 Cor. 3:18; 2 Peter 1:21.3

#### 6. Creation

God has revealed in Scripture the authentic and historical account of His creative activity. He created the universe, and in a recent six-day creation the Lord made 'the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them' and rested on the seventh day. Thus 'He established the Satbath as a perpetual memorial of the work 'He performed and completed during six literal days that together with the Sabbath constituted the same unit of time that we call a week today. The first man and woman were made in the image of God as the crowning work of Creation, given dominion over the world, and charged with responsibility to care for it. When the world was finished it was 'very good,' declaring the glory of God. (Gen. 1-2; 5; 11; Exod. 20:8-11; Ps. 19:16; 33:6, 9; 104; bs. 45:12, 18; Acts 17:24; Col. 1:16; Heb. 1:2; 11:3; Rev. 10:6; 44:7.)

#### 7. The Nature of Humanity

Man and woman were made in the image of God with individuality, the power and freedom to think and to do. Though created free beings, each is an indivisible unity of body, mind, and spirit, dependent upon God for life and breath and all else. When our first parents disobeyed God, they denied their dependence upon Him and fell from their high position. The image of God in them was marred and they became subject to death. Their descendants share this fallen nature and its consequences. They are born with weaknesses and tendencies to evil. But God in Christ reconciled the world to Himself and by His Spirit restores in penitent mortals the image of their Maker. Created for the glory of God, they are called to love Him and one another, and to care for their environment. (Gen. 1:26-28; 2:7, 15; 3; Ps. 8:4-8: 51:5, 10; 58:3; Jer. 17:9; Acts 17:24-28; Rom. 5:12-17; 2 Cor. 5:19, 20; Eph. 2:3; 1 Thess. 5:23; 1 John 3:4; 4:7, 8, 11, 20.)

#### 8. The Great Controversy


All humanity is now involved in a great controversy between Christ and Satan regarding the character of God, His law, and His sovereignty over the universe. This conflict originated in heaven when a created being, endowed with freedom of choice, in self-exaltation became Satan, God's adversary, and led into rebellion a portion of the angels. He introduced the spirit of rebellion into this world when he led Adam and Eve into sin. This human sin resulted in the distortion of the image of God in humanity, the disordering of the created world, and its eventual devastation at the time of the global flood, as presented in the historical account of Genesis 1-11. Observed by the whole creation, this world became the arena of the universal conflict, out of which the God of love will ultimately be vindicated. To assist His people in this controversy. Christ sends the Holy Spirit and the loyal angels to guide, protect, and sustain them in the way of salvation. #### 9. The Life, Death, and Resurrection of Christ



#### PREFACE.

The present Year Book of the Seventh-day Adventist denomination is the fourteenth of the series in which the denominational directories have been issued in this form. Beginning with the year 1883, a Year Book was issued annually until 1894. From that year until 1903, the directories of the denomination were issued in the "General Conference Bulletin."

A Year Book is considered to be a necessary feature in connection with the work of the denomination, and its pages are intended to convey accurate information regarding all the organizations, institutions, and enterprises in any way connected with the cause. The rapidity with which changes are constantly made in the force and location of workers, and in the members of boards and committees, as well as of officers, makes it absolutely impossible to present a directory that will remain strictly accurate in every respect for a great length of time. Changes occur so frequently that a daily revision would be necessary to indicate all the modifications that are made. This fact, however, should furnish a source of gratification, indicating, as it does, the rapid advancement of the work which the cause represents.

The information which the following pages contain is brought down to February 10, 1905, when the pages were closed for the press.

The closing of the matter for this book just before the end of the year 1904, makes it impossible to give statistical returns brought down to a recent date, from the fact that these returns are not received until a number of weeks later. The statistics given, therefore, are in most cases those reported for December 31, 1903, except where otherwise stated.

Those who are not familiar with the arrangement of the matter contained in these pages would do well to note the following suggestions regarding the best method of finding names and addresses. 
